Parade Print

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
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Welcome to my first edition of Parade in Print, I hope you enjoy reading it!

We are now confident that we have access to substantial funds and are agreeing the look and feel of the new cricket school. Yet another members forum at the AGM will be dominated by an update, but this time with a real sense of progress.

A special thank you to Andy Linnett and his team for taking on the mantle of the Parade in Print and delivering such an excellent product. Andy has had his own personal challenges this year and our best wishes go to him, Emma and James.

I would like to conclude by paying a personal tribute to Tom in his first year as captain. As someone who had the privilege of being in his position, and at a significantly older age! I am hugely impressed by the way he has lead the team, developed a sense of purpose and unity and inspired people to the cause. I was still wrestling with some of this stuff after five years! He is a young captain, with a good heart, and a talented squad with an opportunity to keep us in a really competitive position for some time.

The success of the 1st XI is dependent on the overall strength of the club and the contribution and commitment of the other sides. My thanks to all those who have led and supported our other teams, both men and women. It was great to see so many girls at the player's supper and the heckling of the 1st XI captain just goes to show the integration that has taken place!

It was a scene of utter devastation. The changing room eerily quiet and grown men reduced to tears with the growing realisation that a summer of perspiration had come to nothing.

It wasn't supposed to be like this. This was my swansong, my farewell after 18 years of representing Bath Cricket Club with pride. A decade had been spent helping the thirds climb the North Somerset League pyramid and this was the final chapter in my four-season stint as skipper with the First Division title at stake. Having been snapped up by the Liverpool Echo on a Bosman from the Bath Chronicle in June, Merseyside was now home but during the second half of the season I'd embarked on the 400-mile round trip every weekend to play.

The stakes were high. It was August 27, the last day of the 2005 campaign and it came down to a winner-takes-all shootout between us and old foes Stratton on the Fosse. Crazy Aussie Travis Appleton had given us half a chance on a sticky dog at Downside School with an unbeaten 93 in our 174-7 off 40 overs. Then legends Jamie Walker, Richard Oakley and Kenny James bowled their hearts out to put us right in contention. However, from the jaws of victory came defeat as in fading light Glen Stansfield hammered the boundary Stratton needed off the final ball to clinch a four-wicket victory and wreck our title dream. What a gut-wrenching way to bow out. After the heartache had dimmed slightly, there was the temptation to keep up the long distance commuting to play but that may well have led to divorce proceedings. No, I needed to find somewhere else I could call home. As word spread around

Merseyside that a short, fat all-rounder from the West Country, who had represented Avon Schools 16 years earlier and once had a sponsorship deal with the highly prestigious Classic Bat Company, was looking for a club the offers came flooding in. In the end on the basis that it was only five minutes from our house and lager was only £2.10 a pint, I signed on the dotted line for Sefton Park Cricket Club.

Four years on I've got no regrets. It might only be three miles from Liverpool city centre but the tree-lined ground is a glorious spot to play. The club's two pitches sit alongside each other, while a third ground is rented nearby to accommodate our Saturday 5th XI. Sefton celebrated their 150th anniversary this year and there is great history about the place. Financially it's a constant struggle and Sefton are one of the few teams in the Liverpool Competition (the equivalent of the West of England Premier League) who don't shell out thousands each year on an overseas pro. But numbers wise it's flourishing with the successful junior section providing a conveyor belt of talent to allow the club to compete with some big spending neighbours. The chairman is a cracking guy called Bob Paisley, the son of the legendary Liverpool manager by the same name. Countless hours have been spent propping up the bar chatting about what it was like going to school in the city back in the late 70s when his dad was bringing home European Cups. Another favourite son is Lancashire batsman Paul Horton, who played for Sefton as a teenager before getting his chance to shine at Old Trafford.

Back in 2006 I was the new boy keen to impress and was welcomed with open arms. I went straight into the thirds and it proved to be something of a culture shock. For starters rather than playing 40-over cricket, it was back to time games with 20 overs from 6.30pm and the possibility of draws. The result is some dismally negative tactics with New Brighton once batting 72 overs against us before finally declaring on 120-7.

games I got the gig. I'd missed not being able to call the shots on a Saturday and at selection it was just like my old Monday night showdowns with Mike Roe at North Parade. Despite the fact the seconds were 300 points clear with a game in hand, Roey would always insist on taking nine batters, eight seamers, five spinners and three keepers for that 'tricky' trip to Dunkerton. Thankfully, at Sefton I no longer faced such a formidable foe. I was able to mount a passionate defence of why our opener who hit 175 not out didn't deserve to get promoted to the seconds because he had ridden his luck, while championing the cause of our 'plucky' 11-year-old leg spinner who had just been spanked for 70 off his four overs.

With selection sorted and warm-ups outlawed, Sefton thirds climbed from sixth in the 3rd XI Premier Division in 2006 to third in 2007 and we also reached the cup final. Having the captaincy was particularly useful when spotting hapless tailenders wandering out and engineering a quick bowling change, hence my spot at second in the list of top wicket takers. But the crazy Liverpool Competition etiquette rule which states you buy the visitors their beer for as long as they want to stay at your club meant it all came at a cost. There's only one thing worse than losing and that's having to pay to watch your opponents celebrate their triumph!

In 2008 we came even closer, finishing second in the league to Northern and being involved in a remarkable cup tie with Colwyn Bay. The Welsh club only turned up with nine players of whom eight wouldn't be allowed out after dark without their parents' permission. We were bowled out for 350 in just 35 overs before they were blown away for 80. I'm pretty sure I was older than the combined age of the four lads I dismissed. We would have won the league but for a stunning display from Bootle's best player – the bald pensioner in the white coat who went everywhere with them. I had Vinnie Abel in my ranks a



short, finishing third. Now in my defence I had to contend with my fair share of nut cases. I had batsman Matt Child taking a leg bye in the final over which meant he was left stranded on 99 and then paceman Mark Boynes suddenly suffering from the yips as he opened up the innings against Orrell Red Triangle with an 18-ball over. To add insult to injury our game at Bootle was held up due to a 22-man brawl on the adjacent football pitch in the summer 'friendly' league.

With my lovely Holly having been born at the end of the previous season I always intended to step aside for the 2010 season and I returned to the rank and file. Matt Child took over but resigned in August because he was abused by temperamental teenage paceman Rob Kelly who refused to bowl in protest at being held back until the 30-over mark. Amid the anarchy, we limped home in fourth. While Sefton celebrated their 150th anniversary, I barely celebrated a run but I'll be back for more next summer.

Every return to North Parade stokes great memories of friendships and fun. And five years on from that miserable day at Stratton, that same hunger for silverware lives on.

a living and I can't imagine a better job, but that doesn't mean

that I view it as a 'job' and want my weekends off.

When I moved to Gloucestershire the club put me in contact with Mark Thorburn, and Bath, as a club that I could play for when not required for county duties.

It has been great to get to know a fantastic group of guys who all love the game and don't mind welcoming an irregular team mate. The county season can be remarkably busy with fixtures coming thick and fast. However whenever I have a Saturday free it is always great to join the lads for the day, even if they do get stuck into me about just about everything!

Games for Bath CC can complement my first class season nicely. It allows me to get overs under my belt before a fixture in the week coming up. It allows me to gain some rhythm and (hopefully) confidence in my bowling.

The weekend match allows me to bowl in a competitive environment and bowl without the protection of a net around me to develop some experience in getting different batsmen out, on different pitches, in different conditions. You can train as hard as you like, do as many drills as you like, spend as much time in the nets as you like, but nothing beats bowling in a match scenario, wherever that match may be.

Bath is a great club to play for. As mentioned before there is a brilliant set of lads here and I really enjoy the banter in the

There is also a lot of talent within the club, both in the first XI and also moving down into the youth sections. From what I have seen the future of the club is in some very safe hands! Although my experience is comparatively brief it is safe to say that I have not seen that kind of depth in talent at any other club in the WEPL.

At the moment I am living the dream; playing professional cricket for Gloucestershire CCC in the first class arena. I am loving every second of it. Obviously my aim is to play cricket at the highest level that I am able to and to play it for as long as I am able to. Every young English cricketer has the same dreams I'm sure. I will always enjoy the great game and playing it, regardless of what the competition is. I am really enjoying my time at Gloucestershire and Bath CC. Nobody knows how long they will be able to play but for now I am just concentrating on taking one day at a time and enjoying the challenges that each new day brings.





After his record season, Parade in Print caught up with James to chat about what was behind his great season.

Why did you have such a good season?

I think I came back from NZ after having a good season over there and was a lot more relaxed than I have been in the last few seasons. Not playing for Gloucestershire at the start of the season led to me feeling under less pressure to perform, along with a change of captain with Tom Stayt coming in as a new skipper, someone I have played a lot of cricket with and who is a close friend generally enabled me to be far more relaxed.

When did you realise that you were going to have such a good season?

Pretty much as soon as I got back I was really hungry for it and in the first few warm up games I was leaving the ball well. I didn't score too many runs but was being much more patient and waiting for the ball. This was a big difference from previous seasons. I felt really positive from the start and around half way through I realised I could do something special.

Plans and ambitions for next season?

Obviously to play at Bath again and to do just as well if not better, but also to step up to the next level. I have played for Gloucestershire for a few years in the 2nd XI and not done so well but feel I have matured as a player and I am ready to perform at that level, and hopefully become a professional cricketer.

Does playing 2nd XI for Gloucs cause any conflict with playing for Bath?

Not really I have the winter to work and get some money together then next season I can give it perhaps one more year.

Why were the 1st XI so successful?

I think we have been building something over the last few years and with Tom coming in as a new skipper. All the players were very supportive and players like myself and Staunts stepped up which is perhaps something we should have done in the past. I just think we really gelled as a team and more

importantly the team has been the same week in week out. This has allowed as to become a strong unit.

Biggest disappointment?

Well obviously the cup was a big disappointment. We know we should have gone further and I think Ealing know that as well. In the league we have been building a side in the last three years and this season we haven't been touched. We need to work out how we are going to kick on when we reach the final stages of the cup.

Next year we will be in a very good position to go further in the cup and maybe we could learn from this year.

How do you balance the cup and league? Is there a conflict?

I don't think so. We really enjoy playing in the cup and just got on with the league like we usually do. When the cup came along we were really up for it. We are learning all the time and hopefully next season we will be ready to mount another challenge.

What are the differences between NZ club cricket and playing at Bath CC?

Training wise they actually train more. Training is twice a week and the weather allows for that. I am not sure whether we could do that over here?

The standard is good at the start of the season when all the state players are around but after a month the Uni players and the state players are away and it all changes. The standard drops as the clubs do not have the same number of players as Bath do.

Who would win when both clubs were at full strength?

I think they would do well in our league but not against us.

How would you improve

I think everyone agrees that we should play 50 overs a side. Is there any reason why we play 55 overs? It's just five overs too many and the win/lose/draw doesn't work. It just leads to negative cricket.

And finally what could be improved at Bath CC?

I think there have been a few disappointing things at the club this season. Mainly the social side. When I was younger-coming up through the youth system-there seemed to be a lot more going on and the club seemed to be a much more family oriented. Whereas now there doesn't seem to be too much of that. For instance, there has been no food at the club. I think there has been a big change this year from previous years. Whether it's us as players or maybe we need to say something to people further up the club hierarchy? Whichever way something needs to happen and we all need to do our bit. It is our club and we want it to do as well as it can both on and off the field.

Bath CC - Extended Family?

Cricket, for me, has always been more than rocking up on a Saturday to play cricket. And to be fair that's why it took me so long to actually make the switch and join Bath CC despite having lived in the city for the previous 5 years. Truth be told, the perception that I had of the club was not great - not particularly friendly, very clique-y and somewhere where I wouldn't want to play. I therefore trundled my way over to Trowbridge each summer, played my cricket and trundled home again. It wasn't great socially and it wasn't great on the pitch but my spectacular ability to remain loyal, despite every instinct suggesting otherwise, held firm.

There was a bit of an aura about Bath. I suspect and hope that there still is, but now, on the inside that aura is about being a club that others respect and hate in equal measure. A club that everyone else wants to beat. A club that is ambitious and has the players and the ability to justify that ambition. On the outside, and for unfounded reasons, that built a perception of arrogance and unfriendliness in my thoughts that I didn't buy into.

If I'm honest there was also no small mixture of fear. This is a good club. The best in the area. Would I fit in and would I be considered good enough to mix it at a level that I wanted to play at? There were players that I'd read about in the papers







but never met before. Mark Thorburn. Fast bowler. I'd seen him bowling from the white wall end a couple of times and he looked a pretty possessed character with ball in hand. James Campbell. Batter. Great striker of the ball – got loads of runs – surely he'd smash me everywhere. (Yes – he does!). Boys on Somerset's books. A ground that looked better in the summer than most grounds I'd played at. In the winter of 2008 I phoned up Rob Maggs, coach of Bath CC. The club had its own coach – Jesus, I was way out of my depth! After mumbling something about being a medium paced, opening swing bowler and that I could hold a bat a bit, Maggsy invited me down to indoor nets. I never showed. It all added up and I bottled it!

I spent the year flitting in and out of cricket, a mystery foot injury kept me out for a couple of months and I played the last two games of the season for Trowbridge. I had missed it, but more than ever, realised I needed cricket closer to home. In the winter I made the same call again to Maggsy and got the same

invitation. This time I turned up. Funny thing is I still remember looking at Mike Roe with some kind of awe and a determination to impress. This was the second team skipper and I needed to catch his eye – forget Thorby (nice guy actually, why the hell had I been so damn scared!), it was clear to me that 2nd team cricket was going to be my niche. Indoor nets turned to outdoor nets (I still hadn't shown anyone if I could 'bat a bit'!) and suddenly there were 30 or 40 guys out on a Thursday night training. Training hard. Training hadn't been this good since I spent three months playing in Melbourne. English clubs that I'd played for had an apathetic approach to training, warming up and virtually anything to do with improving performance. Despite some guy called Mike Smyth giving his best impression of Ian Botham, and trying to smack everything out of the park, there was a real feeling that people were training for a reason. I love this. I have never seen the point of spending two hours at the club in midweek running around half-heartedly, working on nothing and finding nothing working for you on the Saturday.

Two seasons on and I can't believe I ever had doubts. It's a great place to be, has superb facilities out in the middle and guys involved both on and off the field, that will do anything for the club. I've had the pleasure of Roey's captaincy for two years (!!), the mixed feelings of watching Stu Priscott plough

through the oppo's lower order, the sheer entertainment of various toys being thrown on and off the pitch by variously nameless players, JC's constant skullduggery (which saw me fall over a strategically placed chair in a darkened room at Glastonbury this year!), hard work at training orchestrated by Maggsy's determination to get the best out of us and the novelty of being involved in a club wanting to go somewhere. The experience of playing at Taunton last year in the national knockout regional final was about as amazing as I've ever had playing cricket

I've met some great people, had some great laughs, been involved in some great games of cricket and won two titles. I've seen individual's work so hard for each other and the club to achieve the ultimate prize in club cricket – something that has just eluded us two years running. I've watched those games and wanted nothing more than for us to scrape through and keep the journey alive. I've also been welcomed in and learned that there are so many people with Bath colours running through their blood. Despite differences of opinion from time to time on the way to do things, there is one thing that is clear – people want the best for Bath CC and for Bath CC to be the best. I love that ethos and feel very much at home.

The performance of this year's 1st XI sent me searching through the archives to check some of the past records.

Some have in fact been broken.



In 1999 and 2000 the 1st XI were unbeaten in the league as are this year's team but in each year they won 11 matches compared to this years nine. However this year's total of 450 points and the winning margin of 71 points was a record for Bath.

The batsmen have had an exceptional season, scoring over 6000 runs. This is the highest number of runs I have recorded since I started scoring in 1991. There were 11 centuries and 22 scores of more than 50 in 1st XI matches this year, which again in more than I have ever recorded.

James Campbell has had a spectacular season with the bat and has broken two Bath records, the first in scoring 789 runs in the league, beating the previous best by Tom Hankins of 709 in 2006. The second by scoring 1350 in all 1st XI matches, once again beating Tom Hankins 2006 record of 991 runs.

It was clear that the introduction of the 11 over limit had a significant effect in the balance between bat and ball. This was to Bath's advantage with a strong batting line-up and a good depth of bowling talent. In all of our matches there were always six quality bowlers in the side. Many of the opposing teams have existed with four bowlers in the past and relied on the opening bowlers to win matches. This limitation clearly made it more difficult to get sides out as batsmen could afford to wait for the weaker bowlers to appear without having lost too many overs.


During David Black's recent visit from New Zealand he suggested I might have a go at selecting an all time best team

Finally I would like to give a massive vote of thanks to Arthur Chapman who comes to the home 1st and 2nd XI matches to operate the scoreboard and keep the scorers fed and watered. Scoring requires a lot of concentration and you do not get much time off for good behaviour during the hours of play to look after the opposition scorer so this helps make a lot of difference to life in the score box. My thanks also to John and Grace Davies for getting me home from the Devon tour when I was not so well and John Davies and David Black for doing the scoring when I was not available.



Also not forgetting our manager Poppy Squire who equally made my job ten times easier, and last but not least our no.1 fans the parents. Once again I thoroughly enjoyed the team, and it was a pleasure, a great bunch and I would never hesitate to coach them rest in years to come.



Community Coaching

Cricketbath was the brainchild of Grant Sheppard and Mike Jones and was established in 2006. This initiative was launched to deliver more and better cricket participation and learning opportunities for children and young people in the local community.

This includes partnerships with local schools (particularly state schools) and other cricket clubs. Further to this, ensuring that any interest established is linked with exit routes into local clubs (not just Bath Cricket Club) to sustain participation.

Four years on and the initiative has gone someway to meeting these objectives. Through holiday courses and introductory groups, like the Stumpers and Yorkers, the membership of Cricketbath currently stands at approximately 580 children. These courses are essential not only in meeting the objectives as outlined above, but for the funding of many of the other activities Cricketbath undertakes within the community.

By raising finance in this way Cricketbath has been able to provide over 500 hours of curriculum coaching to local primary schools in the last year. The scheme by which we have been able to achieve this is Key Stage 2 Coaching in Curriculum. K2CC is a joint initiative between the BANES Sport and Active Leisure Team and the School Sport Partnership. The scheme aims to provide all children in Key Stage 2 with the opportunity to participate in high quality PE and school sport delivered by qualified coaches. It encourages life long participation in sport and activity through the creation of clear pathways into local community sports/activity clubs. It also develops the skills, knowledge and confidence of primary school teachers, as they have to be present at all sessions.

Being involved in this scheme led Cricketbath to being responsible for the organisation and running of the ASDA Kwik Cricket Festival in the BANES area. Last summer over 24 teams entered the Year six competition, 20 entered the Year 5 competition and 12 teams entered the girls competition all of which were state school teams. We also ran two Inter Cricket Festivals for Year 7 & 8 boys and girls. Both were a great success with 10 schools attending in total.

Inter Cricket was designed for boys and girls who, for reasons of facility or ability, can't play hard ball cricket. It bridges the gap between Kwik Cricket and the traditional hardball game, increasing levels of participation in the game, particularly amongst grassroots initiative is ideal for use in secondary schools and clubs.

In 2007 Cricketbath became involved in the Chance to Shine scheme. It is estimated that over the course of ten years Chance to Shine will reach a third of all schools in England and Wales and engage two million young people. This charity provides funding for 280 hours of coaching during the summer term to a cluster of six schools in close vicinity of the cricket club. In our case last year those schools were; Ralph Allen, Oldfield Girls, Oldfield Park Jnr School, Widcombe Jnr School, Moorlands, Southdown and St Michaels.

Our involvement with these primary schools has led to what I believe is our greatest success to date. At the beginning of 2010 it looked as though Stothert & Pitt CC would be unable to field an under 11 team. With the Chance to Shine funding we set up curriculum and after school sessions in those primary schools geographically closest to the club. By Easter, Stothert & Pitt were able to enter an U11 team in the BDYCL. This is a great example of where the Cricketbath initiative can help other clubs in establishing strong school-club links.

This level of activity in the community has meant we now need the services of professional coaches to deliver coaching on these schemes. These coaches are Jon Green, Stuart Kingwell, Mike Smyth and Simon Marchant.

Cricketbath has been a great success in providing an introduction to cricket to a great many children in the BANES area. Our next challenge is to monitor and track the development of these children and ensure that they have an opportunity to put their new found love of the game into action through local clubs.

20 Over Cricket (Patience and Power)

Twenty over cricket is all about 'crash bang wallop'. But is that really true? Is that really the case for all teams and at all levels?

This is not quite as straight forward a question as you might imagine. The advent of this form of the game at a professional level has attracted great interest and a whole army of new cricket fans.

Watching Keiswetter and Trescothick step across their stumps with increasing confidence as they seem to dispatch every type of delivery to the boundary is equally as impressive as it is inspiring. But it is however, very difficult and you need to be very good. 'Doing a Dilshan' is fantastic, if you are Tillakaratne Dilshan!

I'm not suggesting that players ignore these new innovative batting strokes, and the game must certainly keep evolving, however, it is simply worth noting that these shots –like many others- take time to master.

If this is the case, what constitutes a good competitive score in 120 balls? The key to this for any junior player is to make the most of every ball they receive. Is it appropriate to fiercely attack every ball in the quest for boundaries even if it results in a lot of 'playing and missing'? I would suggest not.

Assuming that your bowlers keep a tidy line, 120 runs at under15 level or below should be eminently defendable. In twenty over cricket there are gaps everywhere in the field.


You need to have your weight forward and your mind set on 'getting bat on ball' from each and every delivery. No one will manage to get a single –at junior level- off every ball, however batting with such intention and focus will only help to aid your

No doubt at some stage you will find - or have done so already- that a score of 80 has produced a tight game or indeed 150 was just enough to see you home. But this is often down to aspects such as inaccurate bowling or difficult playing conditions. Having a positive mindset and a plan can allow you to be more consistent as a team and give you greater control over your destiny in each match.

The longer you are at the crease the easier batting seems to become. It is for this reason that boundaries will begin to flow. Not only will you time the ball better, but you will draw the fielders in and the ball will start to find its way through the infield. The longer this goes on the greater control the batting

So yes, by all means be creative and hit the ball hard, but do it as part of a plan. In isolation it very rarely works. Aim to score a run off every ball and you will find that time after time your overall run-rate will reflect something well in excess of six!


With some slow scoring, and with wickets falling regularly, we found ourselves reduced to about 40 for 7, realising that winning this game was not going to be as easy as it had seemed.





A tribute to old friends

Vince Frank Parker (1939-2010)



Vince was one of our low profile backroom members, without whom no club can function or flourish. He had been a member for many years and had been Honorary Treasurer since 1999, having already been assistant treasurer and management committee member.

Vince was born in Bailbrook Lane, Batheaston and was proud to have been able to move back there in recent years, where he lived with partner Ann until his final illness. He had

been very close to his sister Margaret who sadly died last year. He was educated at Oldfield Boys School in Bath, whose headmaster was the Somerset CCC amateur player Fred Castle. He played local cricket with Bath Exiles – two years as captain.

He was an accomplished musician and pianist. His particular music was modern jazz in Dave Brubeck style and he had made several CDs. He rated Oscar Peterson as one of the greats. He was also a valued vocalist and enjoyed being a member of the Marshfield Bach Choral. Another of his activities was as a member of a local Masonic Lodge, of which he was Master in recent years.

Vince was rightly made a Vice President of Bath Cricket Club in 2007, an honour of which he was humbly proud. He was featured as a Parade In Print 'Member in the Spotlight' in the 2001 edition.

After collapsing at home followed by a short spell in the Intensive Care Unit at the RUH, Vince died on 9th July, with Ann, his partner of twenty years, at his bedside. He is survived by his step-daughter Catherine and son Richard with two grandsons together with Ann's grand-daughter Kayla in New Zealand, whom he adored.

The funeral took place at St. Mary the Virgin Church, Marshfield on Thursday 22nd July, with a packed congregation, including many Bath CC members. The Marshfield Bach Choral sang an anthem, then a farewell message from Kayla and the service concluded with the playing of one of Vince's CDs, playing the piano with daughter Catherine. It was guite moving as everyone stood in silence to listen, then respectful applause at completion.

Perhaps friend Vince's feelings for this cricket club can be truly summed up by his own words when answering the 'Member in Spotlight' question: "What was the best thing you have done?". His reply was "Becoming Hon Treasurer of The Bath Cricket Club"




