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

I was privileged to be invited to their reunion, where I learnt a lot about them. Did you realise, for example, that to date they have produced no fewer than 12 players who have worn the England shirt? No, neither did I until Jan Godman told me. There was, as you can imagine, a great deal of chat about the old days, but the current crop playing against a very useful Welsh side kept up the tradition and won a very close and sporting game by just three runs. The other big day for our girls was the visit of the professional regional women's team, the Western Storm, to play at North Parade. They are captained by Heather Knight, also the England captain and included our own internationals Fran Wilson and Anya Shrubsole. Anya, of course shot to fame for her six wickets in the 20/20 World Cup final against India and is the first woman cricketer ever to be depicted on the cover of the Wisden Almanack. And that's only been published since 1864!! A copy of the publication will be on display in the Clubhouse. But the coup de grace was pulled off by Rob Maggs and John Green, who let the Storm use our ground free, provided they stayed behind and helped the coaches with training our girls. So, our aspiring players received advice and encouragement from their role models – what a day for them to remember.

I would like to pay tribute to our Kiwi, Greg Hay. Owing to injury, 1st team captain, Sam Mount was out for the whole season. Greg had no sooner got over his jet lag when he was asked to skipper for us. Captaining is never an easy job and to take on this role after not seeing the lads for several months and not knowing their fitness or progress levels was a mighty task. However, he settled in and covered himself and the team with distinction, both on and off the field. Thank you Greg. And Sam. Stay off the rugby pitch please.

It was a good season, most enjoyable, only the Somerset Senior Cup 20/20 in the trophy cabinet, but what a great time was had by all, whatever your age and experience.

So, to all our members, winter well, stay as fit as possible and if I don't see you before, we'll meet on the Parade Ground.

On a sad note we have had seen some people leave our club for pastures new, I would like to pay tribute to Tom Baker who has left our club after 25 Years at the club, Tom has not only been an important player member of the club, he has also been responsible for developing our young swords and has been instrumental in to developing some of our star players, Lloyd Davies has decided to hang up his boots this season, Lloyd has been at the heart of our club for the past 11 Years and has been an instrumental player and role model, two great examples of what I would describe as the ultimate clubman. We have also seen James Campbell leave the club, James a former captain and frontline batsman has immigrated to Australia with his young family, another young sword who the club developed into a fine cricketer and a true Bath clubman. # Development report

#### PROJECT UPDATE

In March, B&NES Council Planning Committee approved the development of accommodation for 136 students and new state of the art indoor cricket facilities at the cricket club. The accommodation will be built on columns, with the area underneath returned to a newly resurfaced car park with enhanced lighting and security post construction. Since March, Gilltown and the club have been working hard together to fulfil the planning consent conditions and finalise the numerous legal agreements.

As of late October 2018, Gilltown are scheduled to begin building on site early in 2019 and be finished by summer 2020. Whilst North Parade will remain operational during construction, we appreciate the process will create some upheaval for members as parking at the ground will not be possible. We are actively looking at alternative parking options. Temporary winter training facilities have already been sourced for the forthcoming winter period and we will work hard to minimise the disruption to members.

Rob Maggs, Jonathan Green and Paul Muchall are driving the final specification for the indoor school, including playing surface, lighting, netting and performance analysis systems for batting and bowling to ensure we will have a wonderful new facility which (for its size) will be second to none. The club is also talking to Somerset and Gloucestershire County Cricket Clubs to see how our new facility can complement their existing facilities.

The Management Committee has also put enhanced financial and governance controls in place to ensure the significant lump sum capital injection is appropriately managed in the best long-term interests of the club.

#### Where were you born? Bath

**Previous Clubs:** I've been playing at Bath ever since I can remember. I practically grew up there with my mum being so involved with the club and women's cricket, but I wouldn't have had it any other way, it feels like home.

Which was your best performance and why? My best performance would have to be scoring my first ever ton for the MCC against Wales. Me and my fellow opening batter hit an unbeaten opening partnership of 206, we were playing a fairly young Welsh side, but we were still up against the likes of Rachel Priest. Overall a really enjoyable game and a convincing win.

Best player you have played with and why? The best I have ever played with would have to be Charlotte Edwards and Claire Taylor. When I went on tour to Philadelphia and Toronto with the MCC women in 2016, they were both on the team. The first match we played in Philadelphia I opened the batting with Lottie and it was a dream come true. Both Lottie and Tails are so knowledgeable, and I was so keen to learn from their experiences. Also, playing for Somerset alongside the likes of Anya and Sophie Luff is also so invaluable, being able to play with girls of that standard is always beneficial and so much fun.

Toughest opponent and why? The toughest opponent I've faced would have to have been Yorkshire, in particular Katherine Brunt. First of all, Yorkshire were loud and gave a lot of chat during this particular game, so I was already scared, but opening the batting as a 19-yearold against England's opening bowler... I was petrified. Still clinging onto the fact I hit her through the covers for a single though.

Best ground played at? North Parade obviously...but, the second-best ground I've ever played at would have to be the Spitfire ground, we played there this season against Kent. It's not often we get a chance to play on the actual county ground pitches, so it was such a good experience and to also finish our 50 over season with a win there was even better.

Do you have any superstitions? I'm not really that superstitious when it comes to cricket, I don't really put much thought into padding up and getting ready etc. The only thing would be, that I have to tap my bat on the ground three times as the bowler approaches, before I'm ready in my batting stance.

was another successful season for our youth section. All our teams had regular coaches and managers and attendance at training sessions was excellent.

The Bath & District Youth Cricket League remains the main platform for our youth section (11 squads) to play regular cricket during the summer months, with both boys and girls teams entered in the various leagues.

The glorious weather meant 105 games were played this summer with only eight cancelled.

The girl's section continues to grow in strength and depth with 62 registered members.

We hope that with the school's competitions, the Bath Rec Sportshub and more state school coverage by our community coach in primary we will continue to attract more girls.

Coaching on Friday evenings was delivered by an excellent, and primarily female led, group of coaches. The effect of having strong role models for our girls is hard to measure, but the league results and growth in playing skills were much improved with the Sabres finishing 2nd in the 11-a-side U11 league and making the semi-final of the league cup. The Daggers were U13 pairs league champions.

The next step will be to transfer these performances to Lady Taverners National Cup competition in 2019.

2017 was the inaugural year for the hugely successful 'Fidelius Cup' tournament. This year, eight teams from seven clubs (Bath CC Stars, Bath CC Swords, Biddestone, Lansdown, Hinton Charterhouse, Timsbury, Corsham and Hampset) returned fortnightly to North Parade on Sunday mornings to play in an 8-a-side league. Participation and skill development through playing were fundamental in creating a fun and challenging environment for young players to experience cricket. As in 2017, the hospitality team helped to create the "Bath CC" experience with breakfast rolls and coffees. Biddestone CC retained the cup with Bath CC Swords (Boys) in 2nd and Bath CC Stars (Girls) 3rd place.

The club introduced a new schools league in 2018 (Wednesday, mixed gender teams and Friday, girls). This provided an opportunity for pupils from eight local schools to showcase their skills with school friends in addition to the one-day festivals arranged by Wesport at the Sulis Club each year. The schools attending were Paulton Juniors, Weston Allsaints Primary School, St Stephens, St Saviours and eventual winners Oldfield Park Junior School. Disappointingly, we didn't fill all eight places in either the mixed or girls' league with 27 schools contacted. We will work hard to increase the number of schools participating next summer.

As part of our community assistance initiative, we delivered the ECB All Stars programme for Hampset CC at their ground.

"Stumpers" is the club's point of entry for children in school years 1-3, providing them with an introduction to cricket. Whilst it competes directly with the ECB's "All Stars" cricket participation programme, which is supported by other local clubs, both have the shared objective of delivering a great first experience in cricket for boys and girls aged five to eight. This summer the club welcomed 46 new "Stumpers" all dressed in coloured t-shirts and caps, with eighteen of the group eligible to move into our Gladiators Under 9s in 2019.

Additionally, as part of our community assistance initiative,

we delivered the ECB All Stars programme for Hampset CC at their ground.

Disability cricket also arrived at Bath CC this summer, with one of our most dedicated young coaches, Ollie Parry, working with the Somerset Cricket Board to deliver part of their disability cricket programme at North Parade. This is key to our continuing approach to make our club fully inclusive for all cricket lovers. In July, Ollie travelled to Wellington, New Zealand, to coach at Scots College for a year to gain extra experience and we wish him well.

So far in 2018 we have delivered 38 days of cricket camp coaching (lead by our main coaches, but also giving work experience opportunities to our young Somerset players) with the addition of an advanced section during the summer for players between the ages of 13-17 at the request of Bath CC parents. In the future, outdoor camps will include three mornings as children who have been regulars of the younger group outgrow its content. Even during the off season, the enthusiasm of our junior players has cried out for more cricket, and cricket they shall have, with our performance sessions in October and November.

A new batch of TOPs (Talent Opportunity Potential) players have been hand-picked to receive small group and 1:1 coaching starting this Autumn through to Spring. Our aim is to help junior players progress into senior cricket and follow some of the cricket club's most successful performers of the last decade who were part of the program in its early years.

In the New Year, pre-season winter training will kick off with age groups spread across three different sites (Kingswood Senior School, Prior Park College and King Edwards School).

More information will follow in the next couple of weeks. Lastly, good luck to all 92 of our district trial nominated players. It's great to have so many talented players to put forward.

## What are your ambitions for the future?




# Top tips for girls wanting to play cricket?

His passion and enthusiasm match mine and he has a sharp cricket brain. Watching Jon Green working with the youngsters has also been a pleasure. The way they hang on every word that he utters is great and we mustn't forget how vital this is to the club. Without a generation playing cricket at every opportunity, clubs are finding out how this has impacted. So what

Jon is doing is vital if clubs are to survive and we owe Jon a lot for what he does. Paul Muchall, although only recently having joined Bath CC, has been a real asset and has never once derided me for the Friday afternoon exchange of texts asking for the team for the following day. Above all of these people, top-ranked must be Rob Maggs, the indefatigable head coach and Director of Cricket at Bath. # SOMERSET CRICKET COUNTY AGE GROUP SRI LANKA TOUR 2018

#### CAPTAIN'S REPORT BY URSULA OLSEN-GROOME

FROM 6–17 February, the Somerset girls U17 and Somerset boys U15 county cricket teams toured Sri Lanka. It was an incredible experience and one that I will never forget.

**DAY 1/2:** We left the UK on Tuesday 6th and landed at 12:30pm in Colombo, watched a traditional Sri Lankan dance, had team photos taken and then drove for 3½ hours to our first hotel in Kandy.

**DAY 3:** We went to the Temple of the Sacred Tooth Relic which is Sri Lanka's most sacred Buddhist temple and were able to go shopping around the local streets. After we got back to the hotel, we collected our bags and went to our first training session. We trained for three hours at the Pallekele International Cricket stadium so that we could get used to playing on different pitches and in the heat and humidity.

DAY 4: FIRST MATCH – 6am rise and 7am leave the hotel. We were so lucky to be playing at the Pallekele International ground, in front of the huge 35,000 seat stadium and a small crowd that came to watch. We won the toss and batted. The team we played was the Kandy U17 District team and we beat them by 99 runs after scoring 238-3 and limiting them to 139-6 at the end of their 35 overs. That evening, we had a team meeting where we debriefed and discussed what we could improve on for the next game, before heading back to the hotel to eat dinner and watch TV.

**DAY 5: SECOND MATCH** – another early morning and this time we were playing St Anthony's Girls College at Peradeniya University ground. Again, we won the toss and decided to bat, this time we scored 268 runs and bowled them out for 39 in the 16th over. That meant an early finish and we were able to spend the rest of the afternoon by the pool!

**DAY 6:** We left Kandy and transferred to our hotel in Colombo. On the way, we stopped by a tea factory and tasted different types of traditional teas. We finally reached our second hotel in the late afternoon.

**DAY 7:** Went to some local markets and shopped in the morning and then had our second three hour training session. This time at the P. Sara Oval.

**DAY 8: THIRD MATCH** – this was against the Devapathiraja Team from Galle played at Colombo Cricket Club. We won the toss and elected to bat again. Unfortunately, against a very disciplined bowling attack, we were bowled out for 115, which they chased down in 23 overs for the loss of only two wickets. This

team have won the Sri Lankan Girls National cricket tournament three years running and include a women's national squad player, so they were seriously good, but it was an incredible opportunity to play against such an experienced team.

**DAY 9: FOURTH MATCH** – played our last 35 over match against Anula Vidyalaya Nugegoda team at Moors Sports Club. We lost the toss but were put into bat. This match was really close but we edged a win by 11 runs, managing to keep the pressure on the opposition batters throughout the game to protect our score of 276-9.

**DAY 9:** We had a rest day and a city tour of Colombo in the morning. We visited markets and went shopping, and then we each picked out a saree to wear at the end of tour presentation evening before heading back to the hotel to relax for the rest of the day.

DAY 10: FIFTH/SIXTH MATCHES - we had two Twenty20 matches played at the wonderful P. Sara Oval. The first match was against the Gampha Ratnawali School and we won the toss and fielded first. We restricted them to 111-6 off 20 overs and easily won by eight wickets in the 16th over. It was then time for a quick lunch before starting the second match. We won the toss and fielded first again. The second team was the Colombo U17 development team, who scored very quickly at first before we restricted them to 128-6 in their 20 overs. We lost some early wickets but managed to reach their score in the 17th over to win by five wickets, so it was back to the hotel for early celebrations! For dinner that evening we changed into our sarees for the end of tour presentation it was such an honour to wear this traditional piece of Sri Lankan clothing.

**DAY 11/12:** Had the whole day free which we all spent at the pool, at the beach, shopping and packing. We left the hotel at 10pm and arrived at the airport at 11:30pm for a 02:20am flight, finally arriving back in the UK on Sunday 18th at 08:10am.

The highlights of the trip for me were the team becoming a really amazing group of friends and also walking out onto the middle with the opposition captain and umpires for the toss, and doing that at the international stadiums is an experience that I will never forget. I am very proud to have captained such a brilliant group of girls and playing a sport I love in an amazing country, against some tough opposition.
