I have enjoyed this season particularly since I have watched all the senior teams and been impressed. The 2nd XI had a tough time playing in the Premier 2 against local 1st sides, most of whom will have overseas players and semi-professionals receiving appearance money. I would like to pay tribute to Kester Moseley, the captain, as in spite of the results he kept his team plugging away against the odds. Speaking to him and other team members, they may have felt down, but never out. Come back strong in 2022, I'm sure you will. The 3rd and 4th XIs both went well, particularly the 4ths and the impression I had was that they were a mix of old and young having fun. These two teams are very important as they give the young aspirants a look at the adult game which can never be captured in school cricket. I remember well umpiring at Wrighton Vale for the 3rd XI and meeting a young, ginger-haired 14-year-old arriving with his father to play his first game. He wasn't bad either. His name was Sam Mount.

Watching our women's teams is inspiring. When the reorganisation of the game took place, I was afraid the club game would decline. Thanks to the work of Jan Godman and Rob Maggs, this did not happen and pretty well single-handedly, they have produced what is now blossoming leagues for our two teams – with both winning and signs from the fixture card that the word is spreading amongst other clubs. I like watching women's cricket, as it is a very different game from men's, where craft and thought take over from heavy hitting and intimidating fast bowling. I personally believe that more of us should watch the women's game because they have skills that men don't, and lessons could be learned from them. Don't forget, we have had many more women cricketers who have reached international standard than men.



We continue to make big strides in increasing our outreach community commitments and Jonathan Green should be extremely proud of what he and his team continue to provide to our schools and community programmes. We are employing another full-time coach for the schools, along with delivering a mentoring programme – and all this has been supported by Curlew, the owners of the new student accommodation. Curlew has committed £25k per annum for the next 3/5 years to help us support and deliver our community programmes.

The Boundary continues to contribute in delivering a greater cricket experience, along with contributing to our business results, with a good start from our new Boundary Manager Lauren Abraham.

Our playing outfields and pitches remain key to ensuring we have first-class facilities and continue to improve under the watchful eye of Gordon Gill, supported by Darren and Alex who have done some fabulous work this year in and around both grounds. They are a real credit to our club and our players should be so grateful for the hard work this team puts in to produce the pitches for you all to flourish on.

Our staff remain committed and focused in delivering our club's vision and have all delivered some great results in what have been extremely challenging times.

Finally, I would like to thank all of our members and supporters, who have all witnessed yet another successful season for the whole club.

My grounds apprenticeship started at the club pre-season. Nine months in, part of me feels like I've been at the club forever. The other half tells me I've not seen a year through, and I'm hit with a realisation of how much I have to learn.

My previous working life was in hospitality, but a change of lifestyle was needed and so I turned to my passion for sport – taking up a duty manager role at Odd Down Sports Ground. However, COVID-19 hit, and furlough saw me frustratingly home-bound. This is when I heard about the grounds apprenticeship opportunity at Bath. It's with thanks to Darren for the heads up and to Matt and Rob that they were happy to take on someone who isn't of traditional apprenticeship age!

As a Bath local, passionate about cricket, I've often walked along North Parade heading for town, watching the groundsman working on the square and thinking what an office they had to work in. I never dreamt that I'd have the opportunity to spend my working days on the hallowed turf.

It's fair to say I had a nervous start, but it became apparent that I had two of the best to show me the way. Gordon, who is much respected in the grounds industry – having been the region's pitch advisor – and Darren, who was previously Head Groundsman at Bath Rugby.

I have now completed my Level 1 cricket grounds certificate and will be starting Level 2 Turf Management in the coming year, thanks to the club's commitment to employee development.

During the season my main responsibility was to prepare pitches at the Brownsword ground for the Juniors, 3rds and 4ths. I also have a vested interest in the ground with my team, The Star CC, playing there on a Sunday.

One of the highlights of my year was when Karl McDermott invited Darren and I up to Lords to have a look around and spend some time talking squares, outfields and the industry in general. He was in the process of preparing the ground for the England v India summer test and I couldn't resist taking the opportunity to have a little shadow bat on the pitch where Root and Kholi would be battling it out!

In my nine months so far, I have realised that there is more to groundwork than 'cutting grass'. Looking back over the season, I've learnt so much. Some examples are spring preparation including pre-season rolling, verti-cutting, drag matting, fertilisers, pesticides, different loams, seeding, pregermination, marking out pitches – including junior pitches – levelling, earthworms and the problems they cause, height of cut (HOC), leatherjackets, end of season renovations, dew brushing, aeration. And I could go on!

The reward of the job is obviously watching the club's players enjoying their cricket and getting the most out of the surfaces we provide. I'm thoroughly looking forward to my second season on the grounds with significantly more knowledge than I started my first.

This season I want to get to know more of you so feel free to come by the shed and say hello.

Having joined Bath at the age of seven, it's fair to say I have a good understanding of the association that the club has with the National Knockout. I still remember the conversation I had with my dad after he'd been to watch the final in 2003, which featured players who would not only go on to be my coaches, but also my teammates.

Every year there are games that hang on a knife-edge, and it can be incredibly difficult to keep alive the dream of not only reaching the final, but finally winning that elusive title. If it wasn't for an outstanding bowling performance in the pouring rain against Potterne, we could have been out of the cup on a coin toss in Round 1. One of the best cup hundred's I've seen from Tim Rouse saw us home, chasing 270 against Bridgwater - and it was moments like that which gave us the belief that maybe this was the year for Bath.



AT THE CORE Physiotherapy & Wellbeing Clinic

A Physio clinic with the ambition to keep you moving well for longer



Adey Saunderson partnered with Paul Tisdale and his wife Julia last year to launch At The Core, a physiotherapy and wellbeing clinic in Walcot Street. Their successful careers in elite sport, Paul a football manager, Adey, a highly regarded physiotherapist who has worked in Championship and Premiership Rugby and the English Football League, are a winning combination.

Despite first opening their doors at an extremely challenging time (just two months before the second lockdown), the clinic has helped over 200 patients with injury rehabilitation, mobility and pain relief. A testament to breadth of service perhaps? At The Core is more than just a physio practice. Alongside the traditional therapies you might expect, its point of difference is the innovative MBST machine, giving the clinic a distinct advantage over other physiotherapy practices in Bath.

MBST delivers magnetic resonance therapy (MRT), an innovative treatment that looks to stimulate tissue healing and provide relief for a range of injuries and conditions. Paul first encountered MRT when he saw the positive effect it was having on athletes following treatment. In elite sport, it is imperative that players are back to match fitness as quickly as possible and MRT can be an impactful part of a sports rehabilitation treatment programme.

MRT has similar principles to MRI [Magnetic Resonance Imagery]. By lessening the intensity of the magnetic waves, MRT focuses on trying to stimulate cellular activity in order to aid in the healing process of a specific tissue, and reduce pain and inflammation. And it's easy too. Non-invasive and completely pain free. During a course of MRT therapy, there is little to do but lay back and relax. Patients often take a book, listen to music, or simply take a nap.

Osteoarthritis (normal age related degeneration within our joints) is a common complaint amongst people who have enjoyed, and continue to enjoy, an active lifestyle. With no cure, only a range of treatments to help alleviate painful symptoms, osteoarthritis can sometimes lead to joint repair or replacement surgery. This is where MRT has been shown to help. Mum often relied on my map-reading skills to get us to my various sporting fixtures. This probably explains why I was 45 minutes late to my first session for Bath Cricket Club in Peter Whites' indoor school. In my defence, I was eleven, it was dark, and it was peak rush-hour in Bath. I had never seen so many girls who could throw overarm, which is mad when you consider where the sport is now. I remember being in shock, as I thought I was the only girl who could.

I was a really shy kid; I didn't talk much at training, but I would count down the days until I was back at Peter Whites. The coaches always looked out for me and made sure I got good batting time; I was never the one with my hand up to put my pads on, even though I was desperate to bat! I spent a lot of winter evenings of my early cricket career in that indoor school. It was freezing cold, the lighting was dim and there was ivy growing on the wall. But I loved it, along with North Parade; nothing beats North Parade on a summer's day. Bath CC had quickly become my favourite place.

Fast-forward 19 years, I've retired from international cricket, having represented my country over 60 times, and I'm a proud owner of a World Cup winners medal. I would have loved to have played more matches for England; I don't think I've reached my ceiling yet. Nevertheless, I wanted more game time up the order - I am a cricketer after all! Stepping away from international cricket opens up more opportunities for me in the domestic game, and I

am excited to throw myself into being a professional player for the Western Storm and to continue to play in the Hundred after winning in the inaugural season with the Oval Invincibles.

It felt fitting to start this article talking about Peter Whites, considering the club has a fantastic new facility opening in 2022. I'm sure that it will provide players across the club with the same fond memories and opportunities that the old indoor school(s) gave me. There's not the space in this piece to reminisce on all my great times at the club - from having the honour of playing for the Wanderers to training with Greeny as I took my first steps in international cricket. The club has always been a constant for me, which was particularly important when I fell out of the England setup for five years in 2011. It was always somewhere I could use to train, develop my coaching, or do a few hours behind the bar to earn a bit of money when I was a student. I guess Bath CC is providing me with a bit of a parachute again as I enter international retirement! I feel very lucky to have that connection with a fantastic community and I am excited to be involved again as I move back to the West Country.
